

Get Your Doctor to Listen:

Ask questions, take someone with you, be persistent and change doctors if your doctor is not addressing your concerns.

The medical field has a growing concern regarding the local decline in vaccines for children's rates, since in 2000 some childhood diseases were essentially eradicated because parents felt it was important to protect their children. Among these stats were measles, (often referred to as 3 day or German mea-

sles), mumps and rubella (long term measles, usually combined in one vaccine as MMR. Others included polio, chicken pox, hepatitis B, diphtheria and pertussis (whooping cough).

Various reasons for this unfortunate decline include lack of faith in the medical community, lack of insurance and fear of complications. We are encouraged to discuss vaccines with our medical family doctors, who have accurate information to share and who know your child's medical history. School nurses also have easy access for information as well as state school laws.

Childhood preventative health care visits provide an opportunity to ask questions and to build a child/doctor relationship. Mental health care is important to observe and discuss at every stage as evaluation and early treatment and referral, if needed.

May 4 - Third Sunday of Easter



The disciples make a big splash and eat breakfast with the risen Jesus. Wading in the water (remembering baptism) and eating with Jesus (celebrating holy communion) is our weekly encounter with the risen Christ. Jesus asks us again and again: Do you love me? And Jesus invites us, again and again, to follow him, bringing the Easter life to others.

May 11 - Fourth Sunday of Easter

The gift of new life, of eternal life, is the gift of the risen Christ. It is the promise of Jesus. It was true for Dorcas in Joppa. It was true for those "who have come out of the great ordeal" in the Revelation vision. It is true for us and for all the baptized: Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

May 18 - Fifth Sunday of Easter

Easter initiates a new day. It anticipates a new heaven and a new earth. The risen Christ is making all things new. In the mystery of holy baptism God has made new people of us. Today Jesus invites us to see everyone in a new light—through the lens of love.

May 25 – Sixth Sunday of Easter

Visions abound in the readings for the sixth Sunday of Easter. Paul has a vision about what to do. John has a vision of what will be. Jesus provides visions of peace that surpasses human understanding and power beyond human imagination.
