Taking Stock: The Stewardship of Our Own Lives

You might be wondering why the pastor from Christ, Dryville is showing up in your newsletter. The short answer: Holly Wolf asked me. Holly and I work together through the Synod's Licensed Lay Minister program, and some of you may remember me from filling in a few gaps after Pastor Lang retired. St. Paul's has a warm place in my heart, so when Holly invited me to write, I was glad to say yes.

Since March, you've walked through the year one stewardship theme at a time, connection to the church, the earth and its gardens, freedom, weddings and vacations. I heard about the wedding photos lining your windowsills, and about folks lingering after worship, telling stories and enjoying one another. That's stewardship doing exactly what it should: drawing us closer to God and to each other.

August brings a quieter theme, maybe the hardest one yet: the stewardship of evaluating our own personal lives. Your council president, Ken Sanders, will lead the way this month.

It's one thing to talk about caring for time or creation. It's another to sit still and honestly ask, "How am I doing with what God has entrusted to *me*?" The psalmist prayed, "Search me, O God, and know my heart" (Psalm 139). That's

Back to School Health & Wellness Tips

Book annual check-ups now!

As summer days grow shorter and the school year draws near, it's the perfect time to set your family up for a healthy, productive year ahead. Here are some practical ways to prepare your kids—and yourself—for the return to the classroom.

Get back on a sleep schedule early

Sleep plays a huge role in learning, memory, mood, and overall health. The American Academy of Sleep Medicine recommends:

- Ages 3–5: 10–13 hours (including naps)
- Ages 6–12: 9–12 hours
- Ages 13–18: 8–10 hours

Start adjusting bedtimes and wake-up times a couple of weeks before school begins to make the transition easier—for both kids and parents.

Set screen time boundaries.

During summer, screen time often stretches beyond healthy limits. Before school starts, set clear rules for recreational use. The American Academy of Pediatrics advises:

- Ages 6 and under: no screen time
- Ages 7–12: one hour or less per day
- Adolescents: up to two hours per day

Also, avoid screens before bedtime, as they can make falling asleep more difficult.

Practice germ prevention.

The school year often means more colds and stomach bugs. One of the simplest ways to keep illness at bay is regular hand-washing—especially after school and before eating.

By taking steps now—scheduling check-ups, setting routines, and promoting healthy habits, you'll help ensure your family enjoys a strong, healthy start to the school year.

August Worship

August 2 – Tenth Sunday after Pentecost

In today's first reading God invites all who are hungry or thirsty to receive food and drink without cost. Jesus feeds the hungry multitude and reveals the abundance of God. At the eucharistic table we remember all who are hungry or poor in our world today. As we share the bread of life, we are sent forth to give ourselves away as bread for the hungry.

August 9 – Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost

Elijah finds the presence of God not in earthquake, wind, or fire, but in the sound of sheer silence. When the disciples face a great storm on the sea, they cry out with fear. Jesus says: "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid." Amid the storms of life, we gather to seek the calm presence of Christ that soothes our fears. In comforting words of scripture and in the refreshing bread and cup of the eucharist, God grants us peace and sends us forth to be a sign of God's presence to others.

August 16 – Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost



In Isaiah we hear that God's house shall be a house of prayer for all people and that God will gather the outcasts of Israel. The Canaanite woman in today's gospel is a Gentile, an outsider, who is unflinching in her request that Jesus heal her daughter. As Jesus commends her bold faith, how might our church extend its mission to those on the margins of society? In our gathering around word and meal we receive strength to be signs of comfort, healing, and justice for those in need.

August 23 – Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost

In Isaiah the people are advised to look to their spiritual ancestors as the rock from which they were hewn. Jesus declares that the church will be built on the rock of Peter's bold confession of faith. God's word of reconciliation and God's mercy are keys to the church's mission. Paul urges us to not be conformed to this world but to offer our bodies as a living sacrifice, using our individual gifts to build up the body of Christ. From the table we go forth to offer our spiritual worship through word and deed.

August 30 – Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost

The prophet Jeremiah speaks of the incurable wound of his suffering yet finds in God's words the delight of his heart. When Peter doesn't grasp Jesus' words about suffering, Jesus tells the disciples they will find their lives in losing them. Such sacrificial love is described by Paul when he urges us to associate with the lowly and not repay evil with evil. In worship we gather as a community that we might offer ourselves for the sake of our suffering world.

The Vi Messerli Charitable Trust



In its long history, St. Paul's Lutheran Church has received many gifts from the congregation and the Fleetwood community. The Vi Rabey Messerli Memorial Fund is one such gift. The Vi Rabey Messerli Fund is available to help those with pressing or emergency needs in our congregation and the greater community. It has been many years since the Memorial Fund was established.

Church council has determined it is necessary to remind the congregation that funds for the needy are available. The Messerli family was quite active in our congregation prior to Vi's passing, and in 1999 the family established the trust. Over the years there have been limited requests for the
